"Set Apart to Serve"

That's the theme of the awareness program in our Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod as we seek to recruit men and women, to be "Set apart to Serve"-to bring the good news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to us and to the world. You might find this article familiar. Or, it may be completely new to you. I write an article on this subject pretty much every May to remind you of our need to encourage others to be "Set Apart to Serve." As I revised this article on Monday, April 28, the vicarage and deaconess internship assignment service was just seven hours away (the website counts down the days, hours and minutes) at Concordia Theological Seminary (CTSFW). That's the seminary I attended and graduated from, which is in Fort Wayne, Indiana. And, Tuesday, April 29 was the Candidate Call assignment service where pastoral candidates will have received their call assignments to serve God's people around the country-and even around the world. Now, you might say "We at Christ Lutheran Church, serving Superior WI, and Duluth, MN already have our pastor, so we're set for awhile. What do the "Call" services have to do with us?" Plenty, I say. Now, it's true that you aren't currently in need of a pastor. You can thank God for that. But there are many other congregations who will have the privilege of either helping a vicar or a deaconess intern to gain experience for future service to God's people, or congregations with a vacancy will be getting a pastoral candidate fresh out of one of our two seminaries: CTSFW in Fort Wayne, or Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri.

My point: I'm writing this to help you to see how <u>God</u> spiritually provides for us, his people.

Pastors, (and other church workers such as deaconesses and teachers) you see, don't just show up. Here, I speak mostly of pastors, but of course, we need to recruit others to serve as well. In the case of pastors, God uses many different men to serve his people. Some are single men, 26 years old, right out of seminary. Statistics show a majority of younger fellows graduate from Concordia, St. Louis. (We at Fort Wayne used to-in good humor-refer to St. Louis guys as from the "other seminary"). Some men's paths have taken them to work for a few years-or in my case, over 20 years-because I heard the call to serve God's people when I was nearly 40 years of age. There are men attending or graduating from seminary who are married. There are men like me who were not only married but had one, two, four, maybe even six(!) children. Incidentally, I chose CTSFW because Fort Wayne is smaller than St. Louis, as well as because affordable homes were located right near the campus. You might gather, then, that God uses men from many different experiences and all walks of life. By the way, Christ Lutheran has been privileged to help support Jacob Franck, whose home church is Mount Olive, Duluth, as he is "Set Apart to Serve."

As I noted earlier, God uses many different men and women to serve his people. They all have unique gifts and unique experiences but they all have one thing in common: God has called them to serve alongside people like you as we **all work together** to share the Good News of Jesus Christ crucified and risen to "reach" the world in which they live. They are called to preach, teach, visit their people in good times and bad, laugh with them, cry with them-whatever the circumstances may be. They've found it important enough to quit their jobs, sell their homes, and move their families, all the while trusting that somehow God will provide for their physical and financial needs. Now I'm not here to say that we pastors are some sort of super-Christian or some sort of hero. My point is that God takes care of his people through those he has called. You may know the story on me already; if not, here is a little history: I was working in Fort Collins, CO and served on the

Evangelism board at St. Peter's Lutheran Church. Pastor Russow said, "Maybe you should consider going to be a pastor." I said, "I'm a blue collar man, without a college degree, who is married with four children. I'll either be broke or dead by the time I get through seminary." But God opened all of the doors-even the ones I wasn't sure I wanted to walk through-so that I could finish and be ordained into the Office of the Holy Ministry. You will hear in our worship services that we often pray that God would raise up men who will serve as pastors, and men and women who will serve as teachers, deaconesses, missionaries etc. That's because we—and future generations—need pastors to teach, preach, and to pass on the Good News of God's love and forgiveness in Christ.

I thank God for all of the Christian teachers and pastors I had throughout my life. I thank God for bringing me here to the Twin Ports, to serve you, his people and to enjoy its beauty. Because God does indeed provide men and women who are, by his grace, "Set Apart to Serve."

May God bless us all as we serve together! Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed!

Stewardship

Stewardship in the Body of Christ

Baseball season is upon us. The southern images of spring training give way to the pageantry of Opening Day. On that day, the hopes and dreams of every major league team, player and fan focus on doing whatever it takes to get to the Fall Classic, the World Series. Baseball is a secular way that so many of us confess that hope "springs" eternal.

With all of this in mind, baseball can also teach us a new perspective about stewardship. Think about the game itself. Baseball is a team sport. The home team faces off against the visitors. Yet while it is a team game, there are repetitive, individual confrontations that take place within the game. The baseball game cannot start without the individual pitcher against the hitter. Once the batted ball is in play, the battle is between the ability of the fielder against the speed of the baserunner. Once there is a runner on base, an attempt to steal a base pits

the runner against the catcher. A base hit into the outfield pits the outfielder against a runner trying to score.

Baseball is a team game with many smaller units at play. Without all those smaller units working together and achieving their tasks, the team will lose.

Romans 12 puts our stewardship of the Gospel in a similar setting. The church is certainly described as a team, if you will.

Verse 3: "For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned." This is where the Body of Christ is really seen as a team. No one member of the baseball team can win the game by themselves. In the same way, no one part of the Body of Christ can accomplish stewardship of the Gospel alone. The pastor cannot. The congregational chair cannot. The lead soprano in the choir cannot. But each of these individuals have been added to the local congregation to be built into a team that can win the victory with Jesus.

Verses 4–5: "For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another." In baseball, the pitcher pitches. The catcher catches. The hitter hits. When a pitcher attempts to hit, the result is usually not very pretty. Catchers often do not excel at running the bases. The hitter usually does not do well when they are sent to the mound to pitch. Every

member of the Body of Christ has a unique set of abilities and functions. Not everyone preaches. Not everyone leads. Not everyone sings well. Yet when the congregation assembles together as a team, it can succeed in ways unattainable by the individual.

Verses 6–8: "Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; if service, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching; the one who exhorts, in his exhortation; the one who contributes, in generosity; the one who leads, with zeal; the one who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness." Each member of the team has a role to play. Abilities and opportunities are entrusted to the individual members of the Body of Christ to be used for the

ultimate purpose of stewarding the Gospel for the glory of God and the benefit of the neighbor. The one preaching is no more or less important than the others. The one serving or the one teaching, the leader or the merciful one — all are equally important in the faithful stewardship of all that the Lord has entrusted to the Body of Christ. All this stewardship is for the sake of the other!

A baseball team can have five All-Star pitchers but cannot win if the hitters do not hit. The best lineup in the league will struggle if the pitchers cannot get anyone on the other team out. Pitchers need the defense behind them to play well. Coaches need to lead well. When they all work together, you have a winning baseball team. When the Body of Christ has all its members faithfully stewarding the unique individual talents that have been entrusted to them, the victory goes to Jesus! This is the goal of faithful stewardship! It is all about Jesus!


