What is "Free?"

Free. When you think of this word what does it mean to you? Since we Americans will celebrate the 4th of July or Independence Day next month we might remember that our freedom was won by the patriots who fought to become free from the tyranny and taxation of Great Britain. And, we are still blessed to have many active soldiers who are right now risking their lives, and many military veterans who risked their lives to keep this country free. We can certainly thank them for their service!

As we continue to think of the word "free," things come to mind such as "Buy one, get one free" or "Free: kittens to a good home." The Merriam-Webster Dictionary gives the following meanings for free:

1) having liberty; 2) not controlled by others: independent 3) released or not suffering from something unpleasant (such as free from pain or suffering); 4) given without charge 5) made or done voluntarily; 6) lavish; 7) plentiful 8) not restricted by conventional forms; 9) not fastened or bound; 10) to relieve, rid, disentangle.

Now let's look at a Bible passage: Jesus said, "If you abide in my Word, you are my disciples indeed. And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." They answered Him, "We are Abraham's descendants, and have never been in bondage to anyone. How can You say, 'You will be made free'?" Jesus answered them, "Most assuredly, I say to you, whoever commits sin is a slave to sin. And a slave does not abide in the house forever, but a son abides forever." "Therefore, if the Son makes you free you will be free indeed." (John 8:31-36)

When we think about what Scripture teaches about Jesus and what He has done for us we can use lots of those dictionary terms. Jesus knew that as sinners we were slaves; we did not have liberty, we were in bondage to sin. Without Jesus we would have something very unpleasant in our future-eternal separation from God in hell. But God loved us so much that He sent His Son, Jesus. Jesus voluntarily gave himself-Our freedom cost Him his life. Yet for us there is no charge. We think that we can somehow work to gain our freedom. But, we cannot free ourselves. So, Jesus, who is "not restricted by conventional forms" gave HIS life in OUR place. Through faith in Jesus as our only Savior we can be released and be rid of the guilt of our sin.

Since the Son set us free we are free indeed. We need to know that in a world cursed by sin the struggle goes on. But Jesus has won the victory! Now, since we are free from sin, every day is Independence Day!

You may be oppressed by guilt, pain, and the bondage of a sinful past or behavior, or you know people who are. The consequences of your sin or their sin may continue. But as you learn about Jesus' forgiveness you will see that you can be free from slavery. Or, if you have been freed but know someone who needs to be freed you can tell them what Jesus assures us, "If you abide in my Word, you are my disciples indeed. And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free. Therefore, if the Son makes you free you will be free indeed."

Letter from Jacob Franck

Dear Christ Lutheran,

It feels surreal that I have reached the end of my second year and will shortly be heading off to my vicarage. These two years have flown by, and I cannot thank you enough for your prayers and support, without which this would not have been possible.

To begin my vicarage, I will be heading to Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church in Muncie, Indiana. I am very excited to begin and start this next step in my journey to becoming a pastor. During my vicarage, I will be running the campus ministry at Ball State and Taylor University, as well as assisting at Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church. I will be living at the parsonage at the church, so luckily, I will not have to worry about finding a place to live.

For my classes this quarter, I have taken
Pentateuch II, which was on the books of Exodus
through Deuteronomy; Greek Readings, in which
we cover the lectionary readings in Greek; Church
History IV, which covered the history of
Lutheranism in America; Field Education II, in
which we cover various aspects of parish life and
situations; Preaching Law & Gospel, which focused
on how to properly preach Law and Gospel in our
sermons; Deaf Ministry III, in which we learned
more ASL sign language as well as occasionally
did ASL interpretations for parts of chapel services;
and Dogmatics II, in which we covered various
aspects of the two natures of Christ.

Although the basketball season ended, there were other sports we were able to do with the warmer weather, including Ultimate Frisbee on Sundays; flag football, which was a lot of fun. We had five teams in total; and the annual softball game vs. St.

Louis Seminary, which we won again this year. For my military service, I have been adjusting to my new unit, which is a military police unit. There are two other chaplain candidates there besides me, all from Fort Wayne Seminary, so it's always a good time and we can just talk theology together during drill. Recently, we went to a four-day drill at Camp Atterbury because the unit was shooting their .50 cals and Mk 19 grenade launchers, which were a lot of fun to watch even though chaplains are not allowed to touch any guns.

For this summer, I am signed up to attend a campus ministry conference at Concordia Irvine in California, so I am looking forward to that.

Otherwise, I will mostly be relaxing a bit before my vicarage starts, and I also have some plans to take a trip down to Tampa, Florida, for a vacation.

Currently, I don't know what my mailing address will be at my vicarage, but in the meantime any mail can be sent to my home address of 3622 Crescent View Ave, Duluth, MN, 55804. If any mail is sent to the seminary, it will be forwarded to me, so don't worry if something is sent there.

Again, I can't thank you enough for everything, and I look forward to keeping you updated on my vicarage.

Board and Committee Reports:

Trustees Report: Performed maintenance on the church organ humidifiers. It seems to have performed well again this winter. (Mainly maintains 35% humidity when HVAC is not running). Changed batteries, if needed, and changed the time on Sunday School room clocks.

Changed two U-tube lights in the Narthex. An issue with smoke detectors going ff happened on 4/6 after church. (All smoke detectors are hardwired interconnected-one goes off and they all go off.) It was determined that it was probably the smoke detector above the church organ. (With all the sanding of the walls in prep for painting, a lot of dust was produced and probably fouled the sensor.) Patrick Field and Don Hauser disconnected the smoke detector above the organ until we replaced it. All the smoke detectors in the church have been replaced with hardwired interconnected smoke detectors with 10-year battery backup (approx. \$40.00 each). Batteries will not need to be replaced annually. If the battery dies, the detector will still chirp, and the detector will need to be replaced.

Stewardship

Rooted in Christ, Growing in Stewardship

The heartland is now awash in various hues of green. The doldrums of winter give way to the colors of spring. Now, the promise of spring gives way to the growth of summer. Fields are planted and sprouted. Gardens are planted. Flowers adorn the beds of neighborhood homes and roadside ditches. Green is the shade of life!

Green growth is also the hue of the faithful steward. The seed of faith planted in human hearts in the waters of Holy Baptism grows as it is nurtured in the Word proclaimed and ingested in the Holy Supper. This faith does indeed save. But our stewardship of the Gospel is also designed to bear fruit for God's glory and the benefit of our neighbor.

To consider this, let us look at the hymn, "Fruitful Trees, the Spirits Sowing" (LSB 691). It is very much a stewardship hymn!

Fruitful trees, the Spirit's sowing, May we ripen and increase, Fruit to life eternal growing, rich in love and joy and peace.

- The tree of faith is not planted in us by us. It is the Spirit's work! We do not claim the title "steward." Rather, we are created for it (Gen. 1:26–28).
- He is the One who makes it grow in us. The fruits of the Spirit are borne out because we, by grace through faith, are connected to the vine that is Jesus (John 15). Laden branches freely bearing Gifts the Giver loves to bless; Here is fruit that grows by sharing, Patience, kindness, gentleness.
- Our stewardship is NOT about what we do. It is about what the Holy Spirit does in and through us. That is the fruit that we bear. His fruit for His purposes.
- But that fruit is lived out through us. The world sees the fruit of our stewardship of the Gospel in lives lived connected to Word and

Sacrament. Rooted deep in Christ our Master, Christ our pattern and our goal, Teach us, as the years fly faster, Goodness, faith, and selfcontrol.

- Stewards have been created and redeemed to reflect the image of Jesus in the world. He is the pattern. We reflect to others around us the Light of the Gospel He has shone on us.
- This reflection comes when Christ's goodness flows from us to others.
 Fruitful trees, the Spirit's tending, May we grow till harvests cease; Till we taste, in life unending, Heaven's love and joy and peace.
- Just as the Spirit has created us for stewardship of the Gospel, so also does He cause our faithfulness! He calls, gathers, enlightens, sanctifies and KEEPS us in this faithful stewardship of the Gospel.
- The ultimate goal of our faithful stewardship is eternity. For us. For our neighbor. All worked out by the Spirit.

Green is the color of the world right now. It is also the color of our stewardship and it is growing in us as we are connected to the vine, Jesus! God grant our growth in Him!


